## Holton gives 0's a lift

TWO goals by centre-forward Cliff Holton on Monday night—one a penalty and the other a brilliant individual effort—took Orient two points nearer safety and at the same time dimmed Middlesbrough's promotion hopes. Cliff may be a few yards slower now than in his heyday but his vast experience and

clever use of the ball did more than anything else to win this match for Orient.

Conditions were not ideal for football but both sides are to be congratulated on providing one of the most entertaining games seen at Brisbane-road this season.

At first Orient were too tense and nervous and victory for Middlesbrough seemed a formality. Their inside-forward trio of O'Rourke, McMordie and Horsfield played havoc with Orient's defence but Ron Willis kept his goal intact with some cemarkable saves. The 17-year-old boy has overcome a shaky spell and in the last few weeks has looked a class goalkeeper.

Middlesbrough's menacing thrusts could and should have brought them three or four goals but Orient came back to grab a shock lead in the 30th down by Gates as he was brought down by Gates as he was baring down on goal and the referee promptly pointed to the penalty spot. Holton's second goal a few minutes later was probably the best of the 290 that he has scored. Neatly trapping Willis's clearance, he simply wilds stepped Gates and ran 20 yards, resisting all challenges, to glide the ball past Whigham — a superb effort.

After these two unforeseen setbacks Middlesbrough iost heart and gradually faded in a way not befitting promotion contenders.

Orient took control in the second haif and played enough good football to suggest that better things are in store for them next season. They were well served by the resilient Bert Howe, the graft of Peter Allen, the midfield dominance of Wood and Went and, above all, the shrewdness and cunning of ageless Cliff Holton.

ORIENT'S success in the last three months has been gained mainly through effort. There are few individual stars in the side but the team has a tremendous capacity for work and this, coupled with its ability to maintain a fast pace throughout 90 minutes, has been the
