Orient played urgently in the second half, pulling veteran Cliff Holton out of the attack and sending Brian Whitehouse and Metchick up as strikers.

But Brentford answered the challenge and four minutes from time Docherty spun out of a tackle and swept in a centre that was headed home by centre forward John Richardson.

## Orient player seeking legal advice after rumpus with manager

# 'I'VE BEEN BRANDED,' SAYS BRADBURY

**TERRY Bradbury**, Leyton Orient wing half, is to seek legal advice after being put on the transfer list by manager Dick Graham for alleged foul play.

Bradbury was listed after being criticised by Graham following Orient's second-round replay defeat by Brentford at Griffin Park on Tuesday.

Now Bradbury is to appeal to the Profes-

sional Footballers' Association about the remarks made by his manager. He said last night:

"These allegations could make it impossible for me to find another club. I have been branded. I shall contact the PFA for guidance and will

be seeking legal advice.

"This afternoon I had another interview with the manager. He told me that I was deliberately kicking an opponent during the last fifteen minutes of the match.

"It is ridiculous. My behaviour is a matter for referees and the Football Association to judge. In a career lasting eleven years I have never been sent off.

"Last night was the first time I have had my name taken this season."

Cliff Lloyd, PFA secretary, commented: "If the player wants guidance we shall be pleased to give it."

Said Graham: "I am not prepared to let players take the law into their own hands."
