Orient, London's cinderella club sandwiched between First Division sides Spurs and West Ham, today inspected sites at Basildon, Essex, with a view to moving their headquarters to that area.

Orient, losing £800 a week because of lack of support, believe that a switch from their

present centre, owned by the local council, to an area like Basildon with a population of 140,000, could be their salvation. Charles Boniface, general manager of the Basildon Development Corporation, agrees with the club and today met an Orient director with the offer of two sites in the centre of the New Town.

Mr. Boniface told me: "Its up

to Orient when they move. If they settle on one of these sites I will recommend the Corporation to provide it free of charge. It will then be up to Orient to do the rest of the building to instal their stadium.

"If this is not possible then the move will take much longer because the spending of public money needs approval."

Added Mr. Boniface: "Orient cannot fail to prosper in Basildon. The population continues to increase and the club will have the field to themselves.

"Southend is the nearest town with a professional soccer side and that is ten miles away. Next comes West Ham, 15 miles, then Chelmsford, 16, and Colchester 30.

"Orient should get gates equal to those of Arsenal and Spurs and so end their financial worries."

While Orient chairman Arthur Page has made it clear that the club does not want to move from Leyton, finance and support dominates the situation.

So If Orient, who have already spent more than £100,000 on their current stand, agree to switch to a ground they can call their own, they may rename themselves Basildon Orient.
