NO GOALKEEPER-of all peoplewants a broken finger, but if this misfortune had not struck Ray Goddard, the young Orient player, he would probably have been out of League football.

Last February, Goddard's contract with Fulham was cancelled. Orient signed him on a month's trial, but in a reserve match against Watford he broke a finger.

Orient were hard-pressed financially, but they felt it only fair to Goddard to keep him on the pay-roll. He recovered in time to keep goal for Orient in one League match, and when the season ended was offered a full engagement.

If Ray had not been injured, it is likely that he would have left Orient at the end

of his trial period.
