SOUTHPORT did not win this match. It was presented to them. Orient's humiliating defeat by their Lancashire rivals was an unwanted but not entirely unexpected reverse. Consistency is one of the hallmarks of a good team and one has only to look at Orient's playing record this season to realise that they are the most inconsistent side in the Third

Division. Practically every victory, every encouraging sign, is followed by an unwelcome defeat.

Orient showed not the slightest indication of winning this forgettable game and the crowd were streaming away from the ground long before the finish. The 90 minutes on Saturday were wretched fare for supporters who expected something better after O's fine displays against Mansfield and Bournemouth.

An interval deficit of two goals meant that Orient had to produce something very special to pull the game out of the bag and they never looked equal to the task.

The players I felt sorry for were Mike Bullock and Dave Harper. Bullock, polished and professional, constantly outleaped Southport's tall defenders but he was thinking at least two moves ahead of

his colleagues and his deft flicks and deflections went un-rewarded. Harper ran himself dizzy in an attempt to inject some urgency into Orien's lifeless forward line but all to no avail.

The writing was on the wall even before inside-left Alex Russell put Southport in front in the 24th minute. A shallow centre from outside-right Shaw reached Russell who rocketed a 25-yard shot through a cluster of Orient players. Goddard was unsighted and had little chance of saving.

The visitors second goal should certainly have been avoided. Goddard came too far off his line to collect a wickedly swerving 40-yard free-kick by right-half Peat and was left stranded as the ball, helped by a strong wind, sailed into the roof of the net.

#### Shattered

Proof that Orient's confidence had been totally shat-tered was in evidence during the final 45 minutes when

Southport's goalkeeper, the bearded Brian Reeves, was tested only once. Dyson was in an unresponsive mood and wingers Slater and Parmenter did nothing to suggest that they could save the day.

Mick Jones came on for Bert Howe in a tactical sub-stitution a quarter of an hour from the end but it was ask-ing too much for one man to salvage anything from this wreckage.

To add to Orient's misery Dennis Rofe was carried off the field, having bruised his Achilles tendon in a touchine clash with Southport centre-forward George Andrews. As Rofe, in considerable pain, disappeared down the tunnel Orient's faint hopes of saving the match went with him.
