# Revival

ONLY 4,090 fans turned up to watch reviving Orient pull further away from relegation worries. But that is 5,910 below the break-even figure, and chairman Arthur Page's threat that the club will have to sell their best players if the fans do not turn up brought representatives from Everton, Tottenham, and Charlton to weigh up the talent.

Orient's match-winner, with his sixth vital goal of the season, was centre-half Terry Mancini.
